Take a deep dive into the history of racism and racial inequities in the U.S. Raise your consciousness by learning about systemic racism, challenging stereotypes, and exploring hidden and implicit bias. Engage in a variety of activities and discussions that bring to light how race/racism impacts all aspects of life.

An in-depth examination of historic and contemporary immigration to the U.S., especially in relationship to the American economy, ideas about race and cultural pluralism. The effects of immigration law and social policies on the socio-economic mobility and well-being of immigrant families are examined. *Level of Study:* Undergraduate

SOWJ 2200 Human Behavior in the Social Environment (3 credits)

Provides foundation in the study of human behavior based on content and concepts used by social workers as helping professionals, theories and research from social science and life experience. Includes biological, psychological and social changes of individuals across the life span, and how each life course is also shaped by diversity of time, gender, race, ethnicity, social class and other dimensions. Social justice challenges to healthy development, such as the impact of poverty, discrimination and violence, are also examined.

SOWJ 2300 Conflict Resolution and Restorative Justice (3 credits)

Theory and practice of engaging in difficult conversations, mediating interpersonal conflict and conducting restorative justice circles through active learning assignments. Direct application of examples from court affiliated programs. Limits and potential of forgiveness.

Includes social work and other advocacy roles in policy work.

SOWJ 3170 Policy and Practice for Children Impacted by Incarceration (3 credits)

Increase understanding of the experiences and issues faced by children with incarcerated parents focusing on the racial, ethnic and socioeconomically disadvantaged and disenfranchised populations. Evaluate appropriate evidence-based practices, strategies and policies. Identify and evaluate evidence-based practices and policies that positively impact children with incarcerated parents. Develop legislative and advocacy strategies to promote these practices and policy change. Emphasis on collaborative learning.

Trauma-informed care promotes a culture of safety, empowerment and healing. Gain knowledge of tools to foster resiliency, influence practice in relationships and increase awareness of self.

Simulations, role play and other classroom exercises help students understand how theories and techniques are applied in practice.

Learn agency and legislative advocacy skills with a specific focus on victim advocacy and at-risk populations. Analyze values and ethical perspectives related to social change.

SOWJ 3600 Child Welfare (3 credits)

Knowledge of the historical and statutory basis for child welfare practice. Examine all components of the current child welfare system and its federal mandates. Learn about and discuss issues of child maltreatment/abuse, the rights of children and parents and the significance of family in a system with the authority of the government to intervene and/or remove children. Learn about and discuss theories of practice, family systems and the policies that affect practice in child welfare.

Presents theoretical knowledge and background material, with opportunities to critically analyze social welfare and legal issues.
