Program Description

History includes politics, economics, and aesthetics, as well as social, spiritual and cultural relations—our past, our present, and our potential as human beings. The history graduate program, mindful of the discipline's manifold importance and application, offers master of arts and doctoral degree programs in breadth and depth, allowing for diverse professional outcomes.

Graduate study in history permits students to increase their knowledge of the past and the processes that have shaped the human experience. Such study may prepare students for careers in scholarship, teaching, public service fields, cultural institutions, and many business settings.

General Information

Direction and Advising

The director of graduate studies is charged with directing the department's graduate programs and with the general advising of all graduate students in matters of course selection, financial aid, and placement. In consultation with the director of graduate studies, a field adviser also may assist in directing the student's field-specific work, including: the selection of course work, the master's essay, and advising on the student's next professional steps.

Degree Overview

Students begin with the course HIST 6100 History, Theory and Practice, which addresses methodological and epistemological approaches to the study of history at the graduate level. Master of arts candidates complete 30 credit hours of course work. They also must submit a master's essay or public history project to fulfill degree requirements.

All master's students must complete 30 credit hours of course work and a master's essay or public history project. Included in that total is HIST 6100 (https://bulletin.marquette.edu/search/?P=HIST%206100) History, Theory, Practice and HIST 6961 (https://bulletin.marquette.edu/search/?P=HIST %206961) Master of Arts Essay and Professional Discernment, and at least six of those credits must be in research seminars (HIST 6954). With the consent of the department chairperson, six credit hours of graduate work outside the department may be included in the master of arts program. No foreign language is required for the master's degree.

Students may choose to complete three required courses to fulfill a focus in Public History: HIST 5100 Public History, HIST 5101 Applied History, and 3 credit hours in HIST 5986 Internship in History.

ACCELERATED BACHELOR'S-MASTER'S DEGREE PROGRAM

The accelerated degree program in history allows Marquette University students to earn both a bachelor of arts degree with a major or minor in history and a master of arts degree in history in five years. This option is especially well-suited for students pursuing careers in public history and allied fields. For additional information about requirements, interested students should contact the Department of History.

ADP students complete 12 hours of approved graduate credit in history during the senior undergraduate year that count as part of the undergraduate credit hour requirement.

As seniors, the students enroll in HIST 6100 History, Theory and Practice, a required class for all entering graduate students, during the fall term. In the spring, they enroll in the graduate research seminar (HIST 6954 Seminar in History). That course may be counted as the seminar requirement for the history major. During the senior year, they also enroll in two other graduate classes at the 5000 or 6000 level that relate to their proposed field of history as advised by the director of graduate studies. These graduate courses offer students the possibility to pursue topics of interest to them in more depth than they are able to in undergraduate classes. They also couple smaller class sizes and more opportunities for participation with an emphasis on the refinement of student research skills.

All remaining master's degree requirements may be completed during the subsequent fall and spring terms.

As a master's candidate, ADP students enroll in a second graduate research seminar (HIST 6954 Seminar in History) during the fall term, HIST 6961 Master of Arts Essay and Professional Discernment in the spring term, and also complete four other graduate courses to earn the 30 credits required for the master of arts degree. The other degree requirement is the master's essay or the public history project.

HIST 5100 Public History (3 credits)

An examination of the means by which the skills and methods of history are applied by professionals outside the classroom. Topics include public history as a sub-discipline of history, historic preservation, and the emergence of history museums and historical societies.

HIST 5101 Applied History (3 credits)

Apply principles and methods of Public History toward the development of a public-facing project in collaboration with a museum, historical society or other community partner. Preserve traces of the past for posterity through documentation ranging from research, writing and online publication; archival cataloging; exhibit design and educational programming; photography and film; and oral-history recording.

HIST 5113 From Colony to Empire: U.S. Foreign Relations 1776-1914 (3 credits)

Examines the rise of the United States from colony to empire in little more than a century. Considers the connections between foreign and domestic policy, the role of slavery in U.S. international relations, and the influence of racial and gendered ideologies on American empire and exceptionalism in the 19th and early 20th centuries.

HIST 5114 Rise to Global Superpower: U.S. Foreign Relations since 1914 (3 credits)

Considers recurring themes, attitudes, and policies in U.S. foreign policy since 1914, including how race, gender and culture have influenced its development. Topics include the two World Wars, the Cold War in Europe and Latin America, the Korean and Vietnam conflicts and more recent U.S. interventions in the Middle East.

HIST 5115 The American West (3 credits)

American westward expansion from colonial days to the 20th century, emphasizing the impact of the frontier on the development of American culture and institutions.

A survey of migration to the United States (and Britain's North American colonies) that explores how immigrants have built communities, sought economic security and experienced cultural change. Addresses anti-immigrant sentiment, race construction and notions of cultural pluralism. Contextualizes immigration--an issue central to American identity--within a transnational framework of global labor markets, American incursions overseas and the worldwide movement of peoples.

HIST 5125 Latinx Civil Rights Movements (3 credits)

Examines the history of Latinx civil rights movements in the United States. Traces how varied understandings of race, ethnicity, class, gender, and sexuality have shaped the ways in which Latinx communities have constructed, transformed and contested identities and senses of belonging in the U.S. and across the Americas. Special attention is paid to the ways in which these communities have fashioned social movements to respond to issues surrounding migration, civil rights, economic justice, feminism, religion, education, colonialism, militarism and popular culture. Takes a relational approach to Latinx history, examining how Latinx communities interacted and collaborated at the local, national, and international level with other communities in the United States, Latin America and beyond.

Explores distinct Midwest characteristics and examines what regional concepts tell us about Latinx community formation, placemakin, and memory within the broader American context.

The historical construction of gender and the ways that diverse women have shaped and contested their various experiences as mothers, daughters, wives, and partners; as farmers and workers; as slaves and conquered peoples; as reformers and political activists; and as immigrants and citizens are analyzed.

Explores the diverse cultures and histories of indigenous peoples in the present-day United States, and focuses on particular themes such as colonization and decolonization, settler colonialism, intimacy and violence, removal and "survivance," assimilation and allotment, along with sovereignty and self-determination. Grapples with contemporary issues related to Native mascots, treaties, casinos, cultural representation, and more.

HIST 5156 A History of Indigenous Wisconsin and Milwaukee (3 credits)

Explores Native Peoples, cultures, and communities of Wisconsin from the pre-Columbian era to the present day. Focuses on colonization and decolonization, settler colonialism, cultural inclusivity, violence and intimacy, removal and "survivance," assimilation and allotment, sovereignty and self-determination. Contends with contemporary issues related to Native mascots, treaties, casinos, cultural representation, and more. Includes engagement with Indigenous peoples and communities through powwows, Native guest lecturers, and community visits.

HIST 5160 Cultural and Intellectual History of the United States (3 credits)

A survey of American thought and culture from the first contacts between indigenous peoples and Europeans, through the development of the United States to the present. Particular attention paid to those moments of intellectual and cultural conflict that illuminate and define the process by which a variety of Americans have shaped a distinct but malleable American culture.

HIST 5165 Histories of Race and Law in the United States (3 credits)

Focuses on common people in the American legal tradition from the colonial era through the 20th century, with particular attention to the 14th Amendment and its role in individual rights and freedoms. Topics include the legal cultivation of "race," the genesis and maturation of the United States Constitution, and the evolution of legal principles stemming from Supreme Court interpretations, Congressional legislation and case law. *Level of Study:* Graduate

HIST 5205 Ancient Warfare (3 credits)

Overview of warfare in ancient Near Eastern and Greco-Roman history, focusing on developments in armor, weaponry and tactics used in conflicts that shaped the ancient world and contributed to the rise and fall of its great empires. Includes the study of wars fought under such memorable figures as Ramses III, Sennacherib, Leonidas, Alexander the Great, Julius Caesar and Constantine, with an emphasis on how those generals and their armies paved the way for modern military engagements.

HIST 5210 The Black Death (3 credits)

Examines the Second Plague Pandemic as a case study for examining its social, political, cultural and health impacts on global medieval societies. Investigates the relationship between the spread of plague and the physical environment, as well as assesses how modern scientific knowledge impacts our understanding of the event and other historical pandemics.

Western European and Middle Eastern relations from the 11th through the 13th centuries; includes Arabic, Byzantine, Turkish, and Mongol areas.

Highlights the impact of phenomena such as religion, science and civic ideals on the shifting constructions and definitions of gendered identities and power relationships from ancient Mediterranean societies to the Early Modern era.

HIST 5249 Intellectual History of Modern Europe (3 credits)

The lives and works of prominent European scientists, philosophers and artists from the Enlightenment to the present.

HIST 5250 Tudor England: 1485 to 1603 (3 credits)

The political, socio-economic, religious and cultural developments in Renaissance and Reformation England with particular attention to the personalities who dominate the Tudor court; the effects of the establishment of Caesaro-Papism by Henry VIII upon the art, architecture, literature and social life of the country.
